# Travel documents

Check with your immigration office to see if you only need your passport or a special visa.

#### **Currency**

Mexican peso.

The U.S. dollar can be accepted in many places. The card is accepted for many transactions, but it is important to carry cash for certain purchases.

#### Weather

#### Temperate (between 15C° and 25C°)

The climate in Cancun is temperate and hovers between 25 and 30 degrees all year round, although in the rainy season, which runs from June to October, the temperature drops significantly and there are strong storms and hurricanes..

The best months to travel and with better weather are from November to May. The months between December and April are the best, since the average temperature is 29° C and rains are infrequent.

#### **Drinking Water**

#### Is tap water safe to drink?

Do not drink tap water. To avoid getting sick while on vacation, use filtered bottled water.

#### Sargassum

Derived from a natural phenomenon that comes from the seas of Africa, it is a brown macroalgae that floats on the surface of the ocean and generates foul-smelling gases as it decomposes on the beaches.





#### **Cancun International Airport (CUN)**

There are also different bus routes that run through the city and the Hotel Zone. Route 1 traverses the Hotel Zone to Tulum Avenue in Downtown, then north toward Puerto Juarez.

The waiting time at a stop is 3 to 4 minutes.

AUTOMOBILE

ilf you prefer traveling by automobile, the world's top car rental companies have a branch in Cancun. If you plan on visiting the attractions around Cancun on your own, renting a car is the best option.

#### **FERRY**

To explore the islands of the Mexican Caribbean, traveling by ferry is necessary.:

- **Isla Mujeres:** This ferry departs from four points in Cancun: Playa Tortugas, Playa Caracol and El Embarcadero (these three in the Hotel Zone), and Puerto Juarez. There are departures every half hour and the journey takes about 15 minutes.
- **Holbox:** To visit this island, you must take a 2-hour trip by land to the town of Chiquilá. From there, a ferry departs every half hour and the island crossing takes around 20 minutes.
- **Cozumel:** The second largest barrier reef in the world, the ferry to Cozumel departs from Playa del Carmen every hour, and the journey takes approximately 35 minutes.

Traditional dishes of the region



When visiting this beautiful Caribbean city, don't forget to savor Cancun's traditional fare. Marked by a strong Mayan influence and its trademark spices, these delicacies burst with a combination of flavors that will astound your palate.

#### "Tikin Xic" fish platter

Its name is derived from Mayan, where Tikin means "something dry" and Xic refers to a wing or a fin, alluding to the cut of the fish.

The primary ingredient is a whole grouper, which is white and firm, then it is cut in half and spread out, marinated with achiote spice (very traditional in Yucatec cuisine for various stews), sour orange juice, in addition to another mixture of spices and aromatic ingredients. The fish is placed on a bed of banana leaves, then roasted in a wood-fired oven. Quite the delicacy!

#### **Salbutes**

From the Mayan Sáal, meaning "light," and Buth, meaning "stuffed," which is to say, "lightly stuffed."

This appetizer is made with a corn dough tortilla, about 3 inches in diameter, then it is lightly cooked on the stove and fried in oil to make it fluffy, crispy, and soft.

A thin slice of tomato, cabbage, cured onion, along with chicken, turkey, venison, or pork are placed on top of each puffed tortilla.

These meats are usually prepared in a red marinade. A must-try!

#### **Cochinita Pibil**

Dish prepared with suckling pig or pork meat seasoned with red achiote spice, diluted in sour orange juice with additional spices such as cumin and Tabasco pepper, then wrapped in banana leaves. The meat is famously cooked in an underground pit oven.

Generally, the meat is served shredded to be eaten in tacos with corn tortillas, accompanied with pickled purple onions and habanero peppers.

## TRADITIONAL REGIONAL DRINKS



The two quintessential Mexican beverages are, without a doubt, tequila and mezcal. Both come from the fermentation and distillation of agave, an aloe-like plant that varies from one drink to another.



#### **Xtabentun**

A honey liqueur of Maya origin, produced in the state of Yucatan from honey bees fed on the xtabentun flower, which has organoleptic characteristics similar to anise.

It is customary to serve it alone, with ice or simply cold.

#### Margarita

The perfect balance of white tequila, lime juice, and orange liqueur with a little salt rimming the glass.

#### **Black Russian**

A cocktail made with vodka, Kahlua and ice cubes.

Kahlua is a coffee-flavored liqueur that originates from the state of Veracruz.

#### **Paloma**

This cocktail is made with tequila, grapefruit soda and lime. It is best served cold, in a frosty glass rimmed with salt.

#### **White Russian**

It's ingredients also include Kahlua and ice cubes, but the ingredient that distinguishes it from the Black Russian is milk.

#### **Michelada**

Prepared with lime juice, Clamato, salt, hot sauce, Worcestershire sauce and beer. Everything is served in a glass rimmed with salt and chili.

#### **Charro Negro**

A cocktail made with tequila and Coke, served in chilled glasses rimmed with salt and lime juice, these last two are added as such inside the drink for a strangely good twist.



Cancun is renowned for its shallow reefs with dazzling colors and extensive sea life. The gentle currents and some shipwrecks make diving in these waters unique.

Sea temperatures range between 25° to 28° C (77 to 82° F) in winter and 27 to 29° C (81 to 85° F) in summer. While the cenotes' temperature is lower, it remains constant at 24° C (75° F). Visibility ranges from 12 meters (40 feet) during the winter months to 27 meters (90 feet) in summer. Visibility in the cenotes and caverns reaches 50 meters (150 feet).

#### The best places to dive

- MUSA Cancun's Underwater Museum of Art.
- Punta Cancun, one of the most popular destinations in the area with colorful coral formations, where it is easy to find manta rays, barracudas and sharks.
- Chitales, a shallow reef (10 meters / 35 feet) with great visibility, located near Punta Cancun, an ideal place for beginners to watch for lobster, rays and groupers, among others.
- C58 Minesweeper, a well-preserved World War II ship at a depth of 24 meters (80 feet).
- Punta Nizuc, an ideal place to snorkel and dive with a great diversity of marine life such as lobsters, groupers and manta rays, among others. The depth is about 10 meters (30 feet).
- Puerto Morelos National Reef Park, located just 100 meters (328 feet) from the beach.







#### **ARCHAEOLOGICAL ZONES**



Amid Cancun's many attractions, nothing beats the access to the fascinating vestiges of ancient Maya culture. Just a few hours away, you can visit important archaeological zones in the Mexican Caribbean any day of the week between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Some even provide guides who speak several languages.

- •Chichén Itzá, world-renowned archaeological complex that includes the striking Pyramid of Kukulcan, giving insight into how the Maya civilization lived centuries ago.
- •El Rey located at Kilometer 18 of Kukulcán Boulevard in the Hotel Zone. The site features 47 structures with unusual architecture in a religious and administrative area, where important ceremonies took place.
- •San Miguelito, located at Kilometer 16.5 of the Hotel Zone. Access to the site is through the Maya Museum of Cancun.
- •Yamil Lu'um, a single structure called Scorpion's Temple, scholars believe it to have functioned as an observatory, as it faces the sea. Located at Kilometer 12 of the Hotel Zone.
- •El Meco, located at Kilometer 2.7 of the Puerto Juarez-Punta Sam Highway north of Cancun. The main structure known as El Castillo stands out as the tallest in the northern region of the state.
- •**Tulum**, made up of more than 60 structures, the highlights include El Castillo, standing almost 27 feet and overlooking the sea, the Temple of the Descending God, and the Temple of the Frescoes.
- •Cobá, enveloped deep in the green tropical jungle, this ancient Maya city rises between two lagoons. There are an estimated 6,500 structures in the area surrounded by thick jungle; in fact, only 5% of the site has been excavated. In its heyday, the site spanned over 18,000 acres.
- •Muyil, one of the oldest cities located 20 minutes south of Tulum, next to the lagoon of the same name. The site has vast vegetation and three bases, in addition to the structure called El Castillo standing at 56 feet.









The Mexican Caribbean golf circuit is among the most competitive destinations on the planet, with the endorsement of international tournaments such as the PGA Tour at Mayakoba, the only PGA event outside the United States and Canada. The circuit has 15 fields in operation, seven in Cancun, seven along the Riviera Maya and one more in Cozumel.

All fields are open to the public, although it should be noted that some fields require prior reservation.

#### **NATURE AND ADVENTURE**



Wonderful natural attractions stand out in Cancun and its surroundings, such as majestic mangroves, exuberant jungles, dazzling coral reefs, mystical cenotes and mysterious underwater caverns.

- Snorkeling and diving in cenotes and caverns.

### cenotes

In the Mexican Caribbean, there are a series of natural wells of crystalline water that are fed by the filtration of rain and the largest underground river system in the world, the Great Mayan Aquifer.

The cenotes were known as "dzonot" by the Maya, who considered them sacred places because they believed they connected to the underworld (Xibalbá), where their gods and spirits reside after death. As you enter the magical world of these caves, the strange rock formations of stalagmites and stalactites will spellbind you.



**The Cenotes Route:** Around Puerto Morelos, there are a series of cenotes surrounded by a unique jungle landscape, becoming ideal places for adventure tourism.

The Route includes ecotourism parks and mystical cenotes such as Zapote, Siete Bocas, Kin Há, La Noria, Las Mojarras, Chilam Balam, Verde Lucero and Boca del Puma.

#### **Xcaret**

Highway Chetúmal Puerto Juárez Km.282

A world-class park with more than 50 natural and cultural attractions. Swim in underground rivers or in natural pools, walk the seabed, or visit the aquarium, the butterfly house, the aviary, the archaeological remains, and walk in the Mayan jungle.

Learn the history of Mexico through music and folklore during the must-see Mexico Espectacular nightly show.



#### Xel-Há

Highway Chetumal Puerto Juárez Km 240

An all-inclusive park on a cove surrounded by jungle where underground rivers meet the sea, a true paradise for lovers of water activities.

Enjoy a panoramic view from its 130-foot lighthouse and dare to go down its slide toward a natural pool.



#### **Xenotes**

Highway Cancún-Puerto Morelos, km 307

A sample of different types of cenotes in the area.

Each one allows you to enjoy perfectly adapted natural environments by experiencing various activities such as rappelling, ziplining, kayaking and swimming.

Includes a deli picnic lunch with beer or wine.



#### **Xplor**

Highway Cancún-Puerto Morelos, km 307

A park with high-adrenaline adventures on air, on the surface, and inside the earth. Fly on zip lines, then drive an amphibious vehicle in the jungle, through flooded caves and across hanging bridges. Also explore the underground world, swim in the River of Stalactites, or paddle through the Underground River aboard a raft.



#### **Xoximilco**

Highway Cancún-Puerto Morelos, km 307

Tour this complex of canals aboard a gondola in the company of an entertaining guide with plenty of drinks, food and music into the night.

#### **Ventura Park**

Blvd. Kukulcan Km. 25

Ventura Park is a family amusement park in Cancun with entertainment for everyone.

This means that no matter if you are a child, teenager or adult, there is something especially for you. It is the perfect park for the whole family to enjoy a day full of activities in Cancun.

#### **Aktun Chen Park**

Highway Cancún - Tulum Km 107

Chen Park, this park's theme is protecting and preserving the environment through harmony with nature.

Tour its cave with a guide to learn about the origin of the cave system, swim and snorkel in the transparent waters of the cenote and finally explore the jungle on exciting zip lines and suspension bridges.



#### **Parque Maya**

Blvd. Kukulcan Km 16

Offering the Hotel Zone a series of activities with the theme of "culture through adventure."



#### Kantun Chi

Highway Federal Cancún-Tulum, km 1266.8

Kantun Chi, Mayan for "mouth of a yellow stone," this park allows visitors to swim in 5 wonderful freshwater cenotes, explore an underground cavern, and enjoy the beauty of the surrounding natural scenery.



#### **Parque Garrafón**

Highway Garrafón Kilometro 6, Isla Mujeres, Q.R.

A place for water activities such as kayaking and snorkeling, as well as adventures such as island tours, bike tours, and ziplining over the turquoise waters.

You can also relax in the panoramic pool, lounge chairs or hammocks, or detox inside a sweat lodge.



#### **Río Secreto**

Highway Chetumal -Puerto Juárez Km 283.5

A unique experience where you will take a trip to the bowels of the earth to be amazed by impressive geological formations.



#### MUSEUMS

#### The Maya Museum of Cancun

Housing one of the most significant archaeological collections of Maya relics in the country, including pieces from various Mayan sites such as Palenque and Chichen Itza.

#### Cozumel Museum

Located in a historic building that dates back to the 1930s and was one of the first hotels in the destination. Four exhibition halls allow visitors to explore the ecosystem of the island, as well as its history from pre-Hispanic times to the present day.

# Museum of Maya Culture in Chetumal

With three floors that allow visitors to journey through the three levels of pre-Hispanic Maya civilization — its earthly life, the underworld, and a celestial vault, always revolving around the venerated Yaxche or ceiba tree.

#### MUSA

Cancun's Underwater Museum of Art, displaying the art of conservation with more than 500 sculptures installed on the seabed and distributed in 3 galleries: Manchones Gallery in Isla Mujeres where the sculptures are located 8 meters (26 feet) deep; Punta Nizuc Gallery and Punta Sam Gallery, both in Cancun, with the sculptures at a depth of 4 meters (13 feet). MUSA has gained international recognition for the originality of its work.

# Ka'Yok' Planetarium of Cancun

Highlighting the fifth generation technology of Mexico, and the tenth observatory in the world with the most advanced science and technology equipment of its kind. The observatory has a 16-inch telescope for stargazers who want to observe the skies in real time.





Cancun stands out with a large number of nightclubs and bars with live music, karaoke or with the best music from magnificent DJs, both in the Hotel Zone and in Downtown, either in a quiet or totally fast-paced environment. It all depends on your mood and taste.

During the high tourist season, there are contests of all kinds for women and men, as well as various promotions such as Girls' Nights, in which women drink free.





#### **Coco Bongo**

Located in the exciting heart of the Hotel Zone, offering an extraordinary musical mix that ranges from the rhythms of the 70's, 80's and 90's, such as Dance, Trance, Hip Hop and Rave, to the most modern musical ideas.

It is famous for its show with flying acrobats, pole dancing, movie clips recreated by live artists, state-of-the-art screens, live bands, DJs, lights, special effects, balloons, bubbles, explosions of confetti and streamers, and much more. Coco Bongo is simply one of the best clubs in the world.





#### Señor Frog's

Restaurant by day, party atmosphere by night, Señor Frog's is one of the most important beacons of nightlife in Cancun.

It's famous for its frenetic youthful atmosphere where the music, drinks and fun have no limits!







#### THE CITY
